150 Years of Mission

A prominent figure in early Adventism was a gentleman named John Nevins Andrews. He played an important role in guiding the young Adventist church with Ellen and James White, Joseph Bates and others.

After hearing the preaching of Joshua V Himes and other Millerite preachers, he was bitterly disappointed when Jesus didn't return in 1844 as was being taught, yet he held his faith and influenced the Advent believers who with him eventually formed our Seventh-day Adventist church in 1863.

Andrew wrote a defence of the Sabbath (History of the Sabbath), He served as General Conference President on two occasions, was a Conference president, and was editor of the Advent Review, our most influential journal. Yet He is best remembered as the first Adventist missionary to leave the shores of the USA.

On September 15, 1874, he set sail on a ship bound for Europe. He arrived there, settled in Switzerland, and started the work of the church with our Adventist message.

A quick calculation and you'll notice that this year marks the 150th anniversary of his missionary voyage. 150 years of mission in our Adventist church. And it still continues. We've still got work to do.

One of the things that strikes me about the story of JN Andrews is the tragedy that surrounds it. He and his wife Angeline had 4 children – he buried three of them. Angeline also died in 1872, and by the time he sailed for Europe he

had buried her and attended the graveside of two of their children. The sadness and grief could have been enough to stop anyone from leaving home. But Andrews felt called by the church and God, the gospel must be shared, so sail he did.

Sailing with him were the two remaining children, Charles (16 years old) and Mary (12). He returned to Battle Creek, Michigan, in September of 1878, called to participate in the General Conference Session. Mary contracted tuberculosis and died in the Battle Creek Sanitarium in November. More tragedy. Another graveside. But back to Europe he went in May 1879. Andrews himself was to die of tuberculosis in 1883, aged just 54 years. He is buried in Basil, Switzerland.

150 years on from that first voyage, and the Adventist church is still engaged in mission, still 'Shaping for Mission' as we say in South Queensland. What sacrifices do we make as we serve our Lord and Saviour? How do we shape what we do so that it's missional purpose is fulfilled? The example of JN Andrews inspires us to reach out and be willing to share God's love with our communities, preparing disciples for Jesus' soon return.

May God bless our Conference as we work for Him in 2024.



2023 Report – Adventist Aviation Association

After an incredibly busy year in remote areas of our conference, your Adventist Aviation Association (South Queensland Conference-SQC) accepted an invitation by North New South Wales AAA president, Pr John Kosmeier to attend the 10th anniversary celebrations of the Brewarrina Seventh-Day Adventist Church in NSW on December 2, 2023.

It was in the mid 1980's (that's almost 40 years ago now), when some of the our South Queensland team as members of the NSW team, walked the dusty streets of Brewarrina distributing Signs of the Times magazines and other literature. In those days with no Adventist presence in the town, and much like Nazareth in Jesus's day, they thought, "could any good thing ever come out of Brewarrina?"

On Sabbath, December 2nd, what a surprise and joy it was to be welcomed within the loving embrace of the Brewarrina Church by some 65 members and visitors embodying a decade of faith and community.

Within the vision of a national AAA, Adventist Aviation Association (NNSW) played a pivotal role in this church plant highlighting the cross-border pollination of the Gospel by Adventist Aviation Association intrastate activities.

The significance of Adventist Aviation Association's mission was underscored by the appreciation expressed for the support from church members on the day. The generosity of those who contributed to this cause enables AAA, both in NSW and QLD, to regularly reach out to remote communities. Brewarrina has acquired a block of land and have plans to build a permanent Church building as soon as funds become available.

Beyond the logistical challenges of distance in this sunburnt country, the real blessing lies in the reciprocal impact on both AAA and the communities they visit. It's a symbiotic relationship of faith, support, and shared moments of transformation that surpass the physical distances covered and the financial challenges faced each time a team ventures into Australia's vast outback regions.

With some 100,000 souls scattered over 300,000 square kilometers of the South Queensland Conference, we take heart in the Lord as Brewarrina Church in NSW reflects on a decade of growth and service. Along with the Adventist Aviation Association in both States, the broader Adventist

community continues to soar, reaching new heights through their commitment to faith in action.

Back here in South Queensland visits by your AAA to St. George, Dirranbandi, Charleville, Roma, and Chinchilla kept our small team busy throughout the year. As well, the appointment by our conference of a permanent minister to our new church plant in Longreach highlighted seven years of faithful work by your AAA in that iconic town. We praise God for His blessings and continued conference resourcing as we commence our 2024 plans to continue planting churches in our part of His Vineyard until He Returns.

The Brewarrina trip carried not just passengers but a sense of shared purpose with AAA Treasurer Jonathan Hunt-Mason and his wife Tanya, along with Michael Grady, Pr David Edgar (AAA president) representing AAA (SQC) at this special event.

Because of expensive maintenance and increasing costs of ownership, we sold our Mooney 201 light aircraft in 2023 and now hire a four-seater Rockwell Commander 114, supplemented by a six-seater Beechcraft Baron both piloted by retired Jetstar Captain, Lester Lewis. We believe this stretches precious donations further and allows your committee to focus more on Mission rather than looking after a plane.

Upon reflection, the 2.5-hour flight to Brewarrina in the Baron at 9,000 feet became a pilgrimage of blessings, marking a figurative journey of faith. It was not merely a physical passage but a testament to the shared commitment of the Adventist community in NNSW and SQC. As the Brewarrina Church celebrated its milestone, Proverbs 3:5-6 echoed in the hearts of those present, emphasizing trust in the Lord's guidance.

The significance of Adventist Aviation Association's mission is always underscored by the appreciation expressed for the support from church members. The generosity of those who contribute to this cause enables your AAA to regularly reach out to remote communities in our conference. Our 2024 Outreach Budget of \$45,000 reflects both our Mission Goal and determination to faithfully continue in taking the Three Angel's Message to the furthest reaches of our vast conference. Here are the decisions that were made for Jesus at the camps.

Summerfest (16-18 years)

Pastor Ryan Vidot from Victoria was the keynote speaker for 104 Campers and 78 Staff (21 years and over), There were 30 Bible Study Requests, and 15 baptism requests.



Teen Camp (13-15 years)

Pr Ian Cangy from Greater Sydney Conference shared evening messages with 104 Campers, 88 Staff (18 years and over), which resulted in 42 Bible Study Requests, and 19 requests for baptism.

Teen Plus (13-18 years)

Milan Anderson, a volunteer from Norway, presented messages to 48 Campers and 47 Staff (18 years and over), which led to 22 Bible Study Requests, and 10 requests for baptism.

JET Camp (10-12 years)

Jacob Boehm, an intern minister from Toowoomba, worked with the team and through messages to 104 Campers and 86 Staff (17 years and over), resulted in 58 baptism requests and 53 requests for Bible Studies

The 18th of November was a day full of anticipation and excitement as a group of 27 staff and students set off from Brisbane to begin their adventure in Nepal. Although our group consisted of people from as close as Brisbane to as far as Adelaide and Townsville, it was truly amazing to see how quickly everyone got to know each other. By the time we landed in Kathmandu, Nepal, after a short layover in Singapore, everyone laughed and mingled as if we had known each other for years. It's amazing how 14 hours in a tin can encourages you to go outside your comfort zone and get to know those around you.

Our first 4 days were filled with frantic hustle and bustle as we navigated the hectic streets of Kathmandu. It was a whole new world with busyness like nothing we had ever seen before; one minute you would be bartering with a shop owner about the price of a cashmere scarf, and the next minute you were dodging a fleet of mopeds roaring past. While staying in Kathmandu, we visited...



Day 5 was full of anticipation as we boarded our 6-hour bus trip to Pokhara, where our journey alongside the NGO, 3 Angels Nepal, would begin. Six hours dragged into eight hours! Bumpy and treacherous roads made travelling over 40 km/h impossible. We were all relieved to reach our destination, and the smaller, less populated town of Pokhara was a stark contrast to the hustle of Kathmandu Thamel region. Our time in Pokhara was both eye-opening and somewhat confronting as we engaged with 3 Angels Nepal (3AN) and the kids in the 3AN Mission school. We were told that many of the children in the school had been exposed to human trafficking in the past, and many others came from tragic backgrounds, so we were unsure how we would be received. The welcome we were given, however, was something truly special. Witnessing the pure joy and intrigue on their faces as they got to know us by asking questions about Australia and our lives was truly a thing of beauty and a blessing from God. Seeing how happy the kids were, even though they had very few material possessions and most no families but 3 AN staff, showed me how important it is to not take things for granted.



Although the majority of our time in Pokhara was spent with the kids, early one morning, we were able to catch a bus to a lookout on Sarangkot hill on the outskirts of Pokhara and were treated to a sunrise that we will never forget. As the sun rose over the Annapurna Range and its rays glinted off the snow-capped peaks, I think we were given a sense of just how incredible God's power and His creation are as we saw the Hymalain peaks of Dhaulagiri (8167m), Machhapuchhare (6993 m) and Annapurna II (8091m) emerge from the darkness.

Villagers Project school. Fundraising events throughout the year in South Queensland leading up to our trip had raised over \$20,000 to be used by the charity, and the moment we stepped foot inside the school, we were mobbed as if we were celebrities, with hundreds of kids wanting our autographs and photos with us. It was a truly humbling experience as we witnessed firsthand the difference our contribution and presence had made in these kids' lives.



Although our time in Nepal was filled with happy memories, it also opened the eyes of all who were there to just how much suffering there is in the world and the need for people to step up and say yes, choose me, I'm willing to help make a



After saying some heartfelt and teary goodbyes to both 3 Angels Nepal staff and the kids with whom we had formed connections during our time there, we continued our journey to Chitwan, Nepal, to be greeted by completely new scenery as elephants loped past our hotel and the sounds of the jungle could be heard. The first few days in Chitwan were filled with jungle safaris, elephant rides, and bike rides through blazing yellow mustard fields, but the part I remember most was our experience when we visited the Captivating International

From Aetheist to Follower of Jesus


